Velma's Clues Cozy Mystery Book Club

One of the most popular sections in the Glendale Public Libraries is the category or genre of cozy mysteries. Most of us would probably cite Agatha Christie's Jane Marple as the first prototypical cozy sleuth. In more recent times we might think of Jessica Fletcher, as played by Angela Lansbury in the television series *Murder She Wrote*, and in the books still being written by Donald Bain and others.

So, are all cozies peopled by more or less eccentric amateur sleuths? Nope. There are also professional independent detectives as epitomized by Hercule Poirot (again by Agatha Christie) or Sherlock Holmes (originally by Arthur Conan Doyle and by numerous authors since) or, perhaps, Kinsey Millhone (in a series by Sue Grafton).

Let us get started with a few fairly common characteristics of most cozies. Every one of these will, of course, have notable exceptions, so I won't characterize these as RULES. Many cozies take place in a small town, or at least a rather circumscribed society. The vast preponderance of amateur sleuths are women, who are usually involved in some other profession unrelated to the solving of crimes. There is often a significant other, who actually is a professional crime fighter. The crimes are generally not bloody or gory, or at least are seldom described in any graphic detail. Generally, there is little profanity in the dialogue and no explicit sex.

What we have, then, are fairly genteel puzzles that are solved by a gradual discovery of clues. Character development and relationships are very important, and almost always take place over the course of several novels in a series.

Most of the series we read are still being written at the time we read them. Recently we have introduced authors from the "Golden Age" of traditional mysteries and a few outstanding authors from the latter part of the twentieth century. Due to the pandemic, we now hold our meetings on Zoom in a virtual setting in addition to the live meeting at the Velma Teague Library. Each discussion includes several handouts with additional information about the author, the series and the subcategory of mystery (i.e. cooking, books and libraries, crafting, etc.) We almost always read the first mystery in a series and, so far, have not duplicated authors or series. The group meets on the fourth Monday of every month beginning at 6:30 p.m. Tea is served at the meeting.
